Update on our Progress...

Gordon Taylor is busy addressing all the issues, getting proposals and scheduling the work that needs to be done at our new Library.

Building Committee up-date: 9-23-2021

We have reached the point of having the roughed-in electrical for both the front and rear of the building worked on to be followed by the wall and ceiling insulation after the electrical permit is signed-off. Some clean-up carpentry for incoming dry-wall work will be required. Hopefully dry-walling will start near the beginning of the last week in October.

The building was modified in the north end to accommodate the location of the AC/Heat split. This required the removal of the east-side transom window, also the west side transom window was removed to provide for more usage space in the galley area.

PGS Issues to pursue:

Since painting is needed now from our work parties, we should finalize the outside trim colors and the inside colors. The shelving issue is around the corner and we need to keep that going.

Work party items:

We will need to have a work party or maybe two, to help clear out items before the electricians start to work. The floors should be cleared, swept and cleaned as best we can. Next in order, there are two areas that need primer painting; parts of the north end and part of the lower 3 feet of the west side, as well as the filled-in windows and doors.



Dwight Whitting, of Oroville, is one of the members of the recently organized California Ostrich Farming Company. He has had experience in ostrich farming in South Africa.



MILLINERY MATTERS.

In the millinery business the flower and leaf trade is dead for the present. A reporter visited the elegant store of Mrs. W. G. Mosher, Main street, to-day, and found it filled with ladies selecting their new winter plumes. Mrs. Mosher said that the only trimmings worn are feathers, for the most part ostrich feathers. The feather-makers have been supplying them so cheap as to put them within the reach of even the poor. Flowers will probably come into style again with the new year.

A NEW INDUSTRY FOR BUTTE COUNTY.

The San Francisco Examiner of yesterday morning has the following:

“E. P. Hoyle, who has been interested for a fortnight past in an ostrich exhibit in this city, and who operates a large ostrich farm near Los Angeles, left yesterday for a new farm near Chico. He took with him a carload of ostriches that had been brought by the Southern Pacific Company from the southern part of the state and will proceed to open out a new farm, as above stated. The location is said to be a good one, and it is thought by Mr. Hoyle that the ostriches will do well.”

We have not seen anything of Mr. Hoyle or his ostriches yet, but guarantee them to thrive here. Everything grows in Butte.

CHICO IS DISCUSSING LARGE OSTRICH FARM

CHICO, Dec. 9.—An ostrich farm for Chico is the latest suggestion, following the receipt of a letter from R. W. Warren of the Pan-American ostrich farm at Phoenix, Ariz., by the local business men's association, offering to sell birds at \$10 each.

It has also been suggested that the business men's association purchase several ostriches and place them in Bidwell park, where a suitable enclosure could be easily erected, as the nucleus of a zoo to be maintained there by the city. Several years ago the local lodge of Elks were considering the purchase of a number of elk to be placed in the park.

Secretary Falk of the business men's association believes that ostriches could be successfully raised in Chico and that it might prove profitable to start an ostrich farm here. The Pan-American Ostrich company has 1800 birds for sale at Phoenix.

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W. H. Robison of the Cawston ostrich farm in Los Angeles is in Chico transacting business in connection with his mining interests at Magalia. While here Robison has been attempting to interest several local real estate men in the establishment of an ostrich farm near Chico. Robison will have charge of the exhibit of a hundred of the birds which the Cawston farms will have at the Panama-Pacific Exposition in San Francisco.
